The Office of the Secretary of State has been notified of special elections in ri-County School District 2358 and Red Lake Falls School District 630.

Tri-County School District 2358 On Nov. 5, voters in Tri-County School District, District 2358, will go to the polls to decide on whether or not to renew the existing operating referendum for an additional five years. If approved, the District will continue to generate \$2,476

per pupil to be put toward operating expenses of the District that it has been levying for the past four years.

The question states: "The Board of Independent School District No. 2358 (Tri-County Public Schools) has proposed to increase its general education revenue by \$2,476 per pupil. This proposed referendum revenue authorization would renew the school district's existing authorization, which is scheduled to expire after taxes payable in 2020. The proposed referendum revenue authorization would be applicable for five years, beginning with taxes payable in 2021, unless otherwise revoked or reduced as provided by law."

By voting yes on the ballot question, voters would be voting to extend an existing property tax referendum that is scheduled to expire.

Polling places include combined polling places of: Lake Bronson Community Center, 112 Main St., Lake Bronson; Karlstad Community Center, 104 Main St. Karlstad; and S., Strandquist Community Center, 202 Main St.,

Strandquist. Red Lake Falls School District 630

Red Lake Falls School District 630 will have two questions on a Nov. 5 ballot. One question is the re-

newal of an expiring levy. The question states that the District "has proposed to renew the School District's existing referendum revenue authorization of \$1,700 per pupil, which is scheduled to expire after taxes payable in 2020. The proposed referendum revenue authorization would be applicable for five years, commencing with taxes payable in 2021, unless otherwise revoked or reduced as provided by law."

By voting yes on this ballot question, voters would be voting to extend an existing property tax referendum that is scheduled to expire. The second question is a

bond referendum. It asks

whether "the School Board of Independent School District 630 be authorized to issue general obligation school building bonds in an amount not to exceed \$8,425,000, for acquisition, betterment and equipping of school sites and facilities?

By voting yes, voters would be voting for a property tax increase.

The polling place is open from 4 to 8 p.m. at the Red Lake Falls City Hall. Absentee and early voting takes place between Sept. 21 and Nov. 4, and can be completed at the Red Lake Falls School District office at 404 Champagne Ave., Red Lake Falls.

New monitors in LHS Commons improve communication

Effective communication with students, teachers, staff and the public is one of the most important goals of School District 564, Thief

River Falls. Recently, Lincoln High School started using monitors in the Commons area to scroll and display important announcements in an effort to improve communication.

Lincoln High School Prin-

cipal Scott Brekke said it had been included in initial plans of the 2011 referendum, but was later excluded.

Brekke didn't give up on the dream. Two years ago, he began working on a plan to put monitors in the Commons.

With the support of the technology experts at Marco, Lincoln High School and other partners in the community, that dream recently became a reality.

Four new professional grade 70-inch monitors have been installed in the Commons. The sound system has been updated, and a 20-foot drop-down screen has been added.

With a quick glance, students can now see school announcements. Brekke also noted opportunities for expanded use during commuevents and school nity


Tim Vagle, technology coordinator for the District, said the system is hard wired and password pro-tected. There are no URLs (Universal Resource Locator) or addresses out there that indicate it's for video conferencing.

The system has the capability of bluetooth connectivity, but for security reasons, it's better to keep the system hardwired. Displaying a video or announcement from also another computer works better with that direct connection.

Vagle also explained that after about a month or so of use, "ghost" images will appear on some monitors, but that won't happen with the professional-grade monitors installed at the high school.





Thinking about summer meals for region's kids

During a meeting Monday, Sept. 23, Cindy Sanden, food service director for School District 564, Thief River Falls, brought the Board of Education up to speed on the summer meals program. The summer meals program has been available to Thief River Falls kids since at least 2016. The fewest number of meals served during the summer, which to this program ends in the second week of August, was 52,749 meals. This past summer, the numbers were much higher. A total of 64,029 meals or about 1,000 meals per day, were served.

Sanden called it a huge success, and that she was proud to even be associated with the program.

The Summer Food Service Program is a federal nutrition program funded by the United States Department of Agriculture and administered in Minnesota by the Minnesota Department of Education. The program was established to ensure that children in low income areas continue to receive nutritious meals when school is not in session.

By now, we should all realize that good nutrition has many benefits, especially to growing children. Not only will it help children do well academically, but will help them grow, feel good about themselves, and have a tremendous impact on their health throughout adolescence and into adulthood.

All of us should also be aware of the obesity problem in America. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 25 percent of all children ages 2 to 18 years now meet the criteria for being overweight. These children are at greater risk for major health issues, such as Type 2 diabetes, high blood pressure, joint pain and much more.

I believe teaching goes beyond reading, writing and arithmetic in classrooms. Children learn from what takes place around them, their interactions with others and even from the plate of food set down in front of them.

Now, some people have issues with the fact that in regards to this program no one checks to make sure the kids come from what the government defines as "low income" families, and some people may be taking advantage of a good thing. Well, it is a good thing, and helps kids - all kids, so what's the big deal? In today's world, twoincome families are a necessity. Not everyone makes it home for lunch to make sure "junior" eats a nutritious meal. It might not even be possible. I also don't know how the program could make it available only to children of low income families without potentially causing trauma to a young child or embarrassment to a family. I like the current program. It seems judgment free and in Thief River Falls, not only offers nutritious meals, but opportunities for socializing with others and exercise, because they're often located in parks.

There's one other thing I think needs mentioning. Last summer I went to the Summer Meal Site Finder at www.fns.usda.gov/summerfoodrocks to see if there were other Summer Meal Sites in northwestern Minnesota. I thought it would be nice to publish a list, which I did. I found sites in Thief River Falls, at Warren-Alvarado-Oslo, on the Red Lake Nation and at Win-E-Mac. That's it. Really? There aren't any low income families in the rest of the region?

Is the absence of meal sites due to a lack of interest, a lack of volunteers, or something else? I don't want to blame anyone, so I wondered if the USDA could come up with an alternative that would work better for smaller communities. Just a thought.



The automation works fine, but I don't fully trust it. I leave the headlights in automatic mode, however I question the standards of the automation. Dusk and dawn are periods of time when lights may be appropriate, but automation may not engage them. I switch on the high beam to see if the blue light comes on and sometimes it does not. I feel betrayed and turn the lights on manually.

Maybe trust is the line that prevents automation from removing our humanity. If I trust a vending machine as much or more than a human, then automation comes down to cost. However, if I am engaged with my fellow human, I probably enjoy the experience more, trust the experience more, and then cost is not as great an issue. It also prevents the robots from taking over.

As a coach, Vagle noted how neat it would be to have the monitors greet fans and visitors as well as display team lineups.

The system has templates for events such as weather alerts, and many other activities. Its use would be useful for any major school announcement.

Brekke and Vagle said ideally, a student will be in charge of putting the announcements on the monitors

The monitors have been up in the Commons since summer, but only recently put into use. Brekke said the students seem to really like

In the future, it might be possible for all announcements to appear on monitors in classrooms. It might also be possible to hook up cameras to the system so that visitors to the school can see events taking place in the gym or auditorium. Brekke used a concert as an example.

The monitors and pulldown screen will also be ideal for many events taking place at the high school.

Brekke estimated the total cost of improvements at around \$70,000. He has also created a plan so that in the event of things breaking down or wearing out, the impact on taxpayers would be minimal. He added that he's very appreciative of the support he's received in the community.

(Continued from Page 1) provides care and support under the direction of a physician. Such care includes skilled nursing services (such as blood draws, wound care and catheter changes), specialized services (such as home IV therapy; physical, occupational and speech therapies; and wound care management), medication management, and personal care (such as bathing, dressing and meal preparation).

Inter-County Nursing has seen many changes over the years. Cardinal and her predecessor Susan Olson referred to the addition of a computer system. Cardinal noted nurses formerly wrote their notes into patient files or the secretary would type them on a typewriter and place them into the patient's file.

Staff have also encountered tightened regulations for Medicare and state programs. They are also seeing patients sooner after surgeries, such as hip replacements, than they would in the past.

One thing that hasn't changed, though, is the ded-ication of staff. "It was the absolute best place to work the expertise, the dedication that the staff has is unbelievable," said Cardinal, who noted the staff are some of the finest staff in the entire world.

Olson and current Director Kayla Jore both noted the longevity of the staff. "When you have that longevity, that paints a picture of an agency that's

doing well and serving a purpose," Jore said.

Inter-County Nursing is governed by a board consisting of five members from each county, including a county commissioner from each county. The board also appoints a physician. Initially, the agency was housed in offices at each county courthouse. In Red Lake County, its office moved from the top floor to the lower level. In Pennington County, its office was located for about 20 years at a Pennington County-owned building along Knight Avenue in Thief River Falls. Later, it moved back to the Pennington County Government Center, which was formerly known as the courthouse.




