Driving home the dangers of driving

Getting into a vehicle is the most dangerous thing most people do on a given day. The Teens Toward Zero Deaths coalition tried to drive home that point Tuesday, Sept. 21 at the Pennington County Fairgrounds in Thief River Falls.

"We are doing this mock crash because we care about you guys, and we want each of you to get home safely every time you get into that car, right?" said Lt. Brad Norland with the Minnesota State Patrol.

Norland narrated the mock crash as it unfolded before the eyes of students from Lincoln High School in Thief River Falls, Goodridge High School and Grygla High School. Mock crash acincluded Vanessa

Farder, Presley Kramer and Sydney Langseth from Goodridge High School; and Ellie Brickson, Declan Coffman, Layla Forsberg, Tavia Foss, Lia Hanson and Cierra Senum from LHS. With the exception of Brickson, all of the LHS students were from a theatre arts class. Sheldon's Used Auto Parts supplied the cars.

The TTZD worked with the Pennington County Toward Zero Deaths coalition to present the mock crash. "Our TTZD officers worked mainly with Tim Cook, NRP lead paramedic for Sanford Ambulance, to create the said Rosaline scenario," Groven, who advises the LHS Key Club. The club started TTZD three years

Multiple times during the mock crash, Norland encouraged the students to follow four rules.

'When you're driving, you have responsibilities, all right?" he said. "First thing you do is make sure you're buckled up.

Norland also encouraged the students to not drive distracted. "We don't get into our car to get on our phones," he said. "If you're going to do that, stay on the couch, all right?" Given the number of driv-

ers traveling while holding their cell phones, Norland said it's like the Hands Free Law isn't on the books. "Your threat is up ahead of you, not down here on your phone, OK?" he said.

Plus, Minnesota law precludes motorists under the age of 18 from even using a phone while driving.

Norland also urged the students to obey the speed limit and not drink and

The mock crash started like many days in the lives of Thief River Falls area teenagers. Two separate cars occupied by teens were traveling near the Multi-Events Center. Foss, the driver of a Chevy Impala, had been drinking alcohol and thought it made sense to be involved in some photography while driving.

Pennington County dispatch soon received a report that a vehicle was all over the road on 150th Avenue Northeast, north of Highway 1. Before long, Pennington County dispatch received another call involving the same car. There had been a two-vehicle accident at 150th Avenue Northeast and Highway 1.

Parsing out who should get a booster shot

Friday, the director of the CDC endorsed the recommendation for a booster dose of Pfizer's COVID-19 vacccine for certain groups of individuals.

The CDC is recommending that people 65 years and older and residents of longterm care facilities, individuals 50 to 64 with underlying medical conditions **should** get a vaccine. People 18-49 with underlying medical medical conditions, and people ages 18-64 who are at increased risk for COVID-19 exposure and transmission because of occupational or institutional setting may receive a Pfizer booster shot at least six months after their primary Pfizer series.

Other than listing qualifying underlying conditions, the CDC and FDA have not established specific guidance as to who may get a booster based on occupational or institutional exposure. Officials are urging individuals to consult with their primary physician to assess their personal risk.

In a Minnesota Department of Health COVID-19 update for media on Friday, officials noted that COVID cases in Minnesota continue to increase.

 $Newly\ reported\ confirmed$ cases in Minnesota nearly reached 3,000 in one day, bringing the total since the pandemic began to 697,182 cases. Officials expect the

total to go over 700,000 during the weekend. On Friday, 27 deaths were reported, bringing the total cumula-tive deaths due to COVID to

MDH Commissioner Jan Malcolm said it's important to recognize that this not only has an impact on those who are infected, but it impacts health care systems and providers who are under increasing stress, students, schools, educators and caregivers. That's why it's important for everyone to do what they can, she said, to reduce their chance of getting or transmitting COVID-19.

The primary purpose of the update on Friday, however, was to follow-up on news that booster doses had been approved.

Minnesotans who got the Pfizer vaccine can receive a booster shot at least six months after their initial series based on CDC guidance:

• people 65 years and older and residents in longterm care settings should receive a booster;
• people aged 50–64 years

with underlying medical conditions should receive a

• people aged 18–49 years with underlying medical conditions may receive a booster; and

• people aged 18-64 years who are at increased risk for COVID-19 exposure and transmission because of occupational or institutional setting (e.g. frontline medical workers, teachers, and

TRF approves preliminary levy

A 7.59 percent increase could raise \$212,257

The Thief River Falls City Council set its preliminary 2022 property tax levy and the proposed 2022 city budget at its meeting Tues-

day, Sept. 21.

The council adopted a preliminary 2022 property tax levy of \$3,008,105.
That's a 7.59% increase over 2021. It is expected to raise an additional \$212,257. The proposed property tax capacity is expected to increase for 2022, so a 7.59% property tax levy increase would result in a 0.862% tax capacity

rate change. As it stands now, the proposed 2022 city budget projects \$36,750,683 in revenue and \$36,470,975 in expenses with \$279,708 transferred to reserves

A Truth in Taxation hearing will be held Tuesday, Dec. 7 at 6 p.m. at City Hall. The council is expected to formally approve the 2022 property tax levy and city budget at its meeting Tuesday, Dec. 21. Prior to formal approval, the council may decrease the property tax levy; however, it cannot increase

the levy beyond the preliminary amount.

The council approved a conditional use permit for a car wash at the intersection of 724 Davis Ave. N. Aaron Arlt and Megan Bourne plan to build a car wash and laundromat in spring 2022. They wanted to build the facility this fall, but Bourne said they had an

issue finding a plumber.
Council members approved the permit provided that they install a six-foot sight-obscuring fence on the east side of the property; remove and replace a curb and driveway apron on Eighth Street; and comply with a review of the ingress/egress location on Davis Avenue.

City Council approved declaring the cost to be assessed and ordering the preparation of the assessment roll for the 2021 Street and Utilities Improvement Project. It is estimated that eight properties will pay a total of \$220,463.94 in assessments for projects benefitting their properties.

Six of those properties are located along Robson Court, which will be partially con-structed. Valley Assisted Living and MAK Properties LLC will be assessed for the realignment of the intersection of Highway 32 and

Cold weather rule protections start earlier and more benefits

This year, Minnesotans can access greater financial assistance and newly expanded protections to keep their homes warm and lights through Minnesota's Energy Assistance Program and Minnesota's Cold Weather Rule.

More Minnesotans than ever qualify for the Energy

Assistance Program.
In 2021, the Minnesota
Department of Commerce, which operates the Energy Assistance Program, has over \$130 million in federal funding, with more expected this fall, to help more Minnesota households. The Energy Assistance Program helps Minnesota households pay for current and past-due bills for electricity, gas, oil, biofuel and propane, emergency fuel delivery, and repair/replacement

homeowners' broken heating systems, and could also cover water and sewer bills.

Commerce raised the income eligibility limit to 60% of Minnesota's median income levels (\$67,765 per year for a family of four) and is significantly increasing benefit amounts to reduce energy burdens more than ever, including up to \$1,600 for energy bills, plus up to \$1,200 for past-due energy bills.

With these changes, over 600,000 Minnesota households are income-eligible for Energy Assistance, significantly expanding who can receive this essential help. During the previous program year (October 2020-September 2021), about 116,000 Minnesota households applied and for qualified Energy ${
m Assistance}.$

The Cold Weather Rule goes into effect earlier (Oct. 1) and lasts later (April 30). Minnesota's Cold Weather Rule, which is administered Minnesota Public Utilities Commission, protects residential utility customers from having electric or nat-ural gas service shut off between Oct. 1 and April 30. The effective dates of the Cold Weather Rule were extended 15 days in the fall and 15 days in the spring by the Minnesota Legislature in Commerce advocated for this change after engaging in annual Tribal consultation and learning from Tribal leaders about concerns that Minnesota's changing climate was leading to cold spells earlier in fall and later in spring.

Both homeowners and renters are eligible for CWR protection – the utility account must be in your name. You and your utility must agree to a payment plan that is reasonable for your household.

Water bill assistance is newly available and households can also qualify for weatherization.

By submitting one application through the Energy Assistance Program, households could qualify for payments to cover both water and energy bills, and qualify them for the Minnesota Weatherization Program, also operated by Commerce. Weatherization helps households with home improvements to conserve energy and lower their energy costs permanently. Water bill assistance is new, created through one-time federal funds from the American Rescue Plan Act.

"Commerce is working to provide Minnesotans with more options so you can afford critical services heat, water, lights, power that you need to be safe and comfortable in your home,' said Minnesota Department ofCommerce Commissioner Grace Arnold.

(Continued from Page 1) responders) receive a booster.

MDH officials stated that the data is clear that there is an added benefit to a booster. They cautioned that it is not conclusive how much it adds to immunity for younger individuals. Additional data, however, will come in and influence the recommendations.

The list of medical conditions categorized as highrisk by the CDC is available on its website. Minnesotans with an underlying medical condition or who are at increased risk because of occupational exposure are encouraged to speak with their health care provider about whether a booster is right for them.

Federal health experts are still reviewing data from Moderna and Johnson & Johnson, and will decide when recipients may be eligible for a booster. Minnesota will be ready to provide Moderna and Johnson & Johnson boosters when they are recommended.

Friday, officials estimated that upwards of 1 million Minnesotans could be eligible, but not all would be eligible at the same time. Officials also stated that there is plenty of vaccine available and that the infrastructure is in place to provide the booster shot. However, officials reminded residents that there are a lot of different ways of getting the vaccine - pharmacies, for example.

There is considerable concern that due to the continued growth of COVID cases, health care systems might not be able to stand up mass vaccine clinics. That's why MDH is empha-

Malcolm said the Delta variant spreads easily and it's not going to go away soon. All 87 counties in Minnesota are at the highest level of transmission at this point, and there's no indication, like there may be in other parts of the country, that the infection rate is slowing.

Malcolm added that cases and the hospitalization rates are still growing.

Kris Ehresmann, infectious diseases director, said it's hard to project what's happening or where or when a peak might occur. The most important thing people can do is get the vaccine rate where it needs to be. She added that the Delta variant is likely not the last variant the country will see. Minnesota and the country, she said, need to continue to prepare for what might come.

Waning Immunity In a response to a question about overall waning immunity, Ehresmann explained that it's natural for antibodies from COVID-19 vaccines to weaken over time. She said the variants have had a part in that, but it has more to do with the body's immune system and the level of anitobodies it's able to maintain. She added that the vaccines people have already received still mount formidable response.

On Friday, Pennington County remained in the high transmission category, according to the CDC. There had been 52 cases in the last seven days, which was a decrease in the case rate of 14.75 percent. The positivity rate was 5.03 percent, a decrease of 2.56 percent from the prior seven days. The percentage of the population 18 years and older who had completed the vaccine series was at 52.5 percent.

Get a COVID-19 Booster shot?

Minnesotans who got the Pfizer vaccine can receive a booster shot at least six months after their initial series based on CDC guidance:

- people 65 years and older and residents in long-term care settings should receive a booster;
- people aged 50–64 years with underlying medical conditions should receive a booster;
- people aged 18–49 years with underlying medical conditions may receive a booster; and
- people aged 18-64 years who are at increased risk for COVID-19 exposure and transmission because of occupational or institutional setting (e.g. frontline medical workers, teachers, and first responders) may receive a booster.

The list of medical conditions categorized as high-risk can be found on the CDC website. Minnesotans with an underlying medical condition are encouraged to speak with their health care provider about whether a booster is right for them.

Minnesota DNR orders **Enbridge Energy to** pay \$3.32 million

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR) has ordered Enbridge Energy to pay \$3.32 million for failure to follow environ-mental laws. Enbridge breached the confining layer of an artesian aquifer, resulting in an unauthorized groundwater appropriation during the construction of the Line 3 replacement project near Enbridge's Clearbrook Terminal.
DNR's civil enforcement

orders require Enbridge to pay mitigation and penalty funds of \$3.32 million. This includes a restoration order requiring \$300,000 in initial mitigation funds to pay for the loss of groundwater resources, \$250,000 for DNR monitoring of calcareous fen wetlands near the area of the aguifer breach and a \$20,000 administrative penalty order (the maximum allowed under state law). The DNR has also ordered Enbridge to place \$2,750,000 in escrow for restoration and mitigation of any damage to the calcareous fen wetlands. DNR will determine what restoration and mitigation is

DNR's restoration order also requires Enbridge to implement a restoration plan to stop the unautho-rized groundwater flow within 30 days. The order requires the company to conduct additional groundwater and site monitoring and report the results, as well as to develop a Calcareous Fen Management Plan. Additionally, to ensure that violations haven't occurred elsewhere, the DNR is requiring Enbridge to fund a re-inspection of any and all areas along the entire route where construction depths deviated from plans (as they did at the Clearbrook Terminal site).

Separately, the DNR has also referred this matter to the Clearwater County attorney for criminal prosecution. The DNR has determined that Enbridge Energy violated Minnesota Statute 103G.141, subdivision 1, which makes it a crime to appropriate "waters of the state without previously obtaining a permit from the commissioner.

The criminal referral and civil enforcement orders resulted from an investigation of Line 3 construction activities near Enbridge's Clearbrook Terminal. Should the company violate the DNR's restoration order, it would be subject to additional misdemeanor charges under

state law.
"DNR is committed to its role as a regulator on this project and is taking seriously our responsibility to protect and manage natural resources within existing state law," said DNR Commissioner Sarah Strommen. "Enbridge's actions are clear violations of state law and also of public trust. This never should have hap-pened, and we are holding the company fully account-

Background Enbridge began work at the Clearbrook Terminal site in early 2021 but did not follow the construction plans it had provided to DNR. The DNR relied upon these plans in determining that proposed work at the Clear-Terminal proceed without effecting nearby calcareous fen wetlands. A calcareous fen is a unique type of wetland, with stringent statutory protections, that relies upon upwelling of mineral rich

groundwater to thrive. The company's plans called for the use of traditional trench construction methods at a depth of eight to 10 feet. The company instead constructed the trench at a depth of approximately 18 feet with sheet piling installed to a depth of 28 feet. This deviation led to a breach of the confining layer of an artesian aquifer, resulting in an uncontrolled flow of groundwater into the trench. Enbridge failed to notify DNR of the ground-water situation at the Clearbrook Terminal.

Independent Environmental Monitors (IEMs), working on behalf of DNR and Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA), first observed unusual amounts of water in the trench at the construction site in late January 2021. This and subsequent inspections over the next several months focused on managing the water in the trench. Under the Public Utilities Commission's (PUC) route permit, the IEMs' role is to monitor compliance with the terms and conditions of the PUC, DNR, and MPCA permits. They do not monitor construction plans. Therefore, these inspections did not identify that Enbridge's construction activities had deviated from the company's plans, breaching the

aquifer's confining layer.


On June 15, 2021, during discussions with the IEMs, the DNR identified that there was a potential breach of the aquifer's confining layer at the Clearbrook Terminal construction site. The DNR immediately commenced an investigation and informed Enbridge that it must suspend construction at the location until the DNR had approved a plan to stop the flow of groundwater. Resolving an uncontrolled flow from an artesian aquifer is technically complex and requires good data and a comprehensive plan. The DNR required Enbridge to investigate the groundwater conditions at the site and submit a plan to correct the unauthorized flow conditions. On July 8, Enbridge submitted a Groundwater Investigation Plan that the DNR approved in revised form on July 12. On Aug. 15, using the results of the groundwater investigation, Enbridge submitted a Remedial Action Plan outlining actions needed to stop the groundwater flow conditions. The DNR approved

this plan on Aug. 18. Through Sept. 5, 2021, this violation has resulted in an estimated release of approximately 24.2 million gallons of groundwater from the aquifer. This water has been pumped from the trench, treated to remove sediment and released to a nearby wetland.

Minnesota counties receive \$36.3 million in Payment in Lieu of Taxes

PILT is one important way Minnesota's public lands contribute to the state's quality of life and natural resource-based economy

This year, Minnesota's 87 counties are the beneficiaries of \$36.3 million in aid that helps support public lands and provide critical links within the state's public recreation system.

National Public Lands Day was on Sept. 25, and the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources highlighted this important contribution of public lands to the state's economy.

Each year, the state's Department of Revenue distributes annual payments for Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILT), a property tax relief program that offsets tax revenues not collected on public lands. Counties have received PILT payments annually since 1979 in place of property taxes on 5.6 million

acres of state-managed lands and 2.8 million acres of county-managed tax-forfeited lands. Money for the payments comes from the state's general fund.

Every county in Minnesota has public lands within its borders and receives an annual PILT payment. In 2021, counties received anywhere from \$21,443 in Red Lake County up to \$3,786,377 in St. Louis County.

PILT is an important and consistent revenue source for counties, and the benefits of public lands go far beyond these annual payments," said DNR Commissioner Sarah Strommen. "With Public Lands Day on Sept. 25, it's a good time to recognize how these lands support local economies, provide opportunities for outdoor recreation and tourism, create habitat for wildlife, and deliver important ecological benefits like clean air and water."

The state makes PILT payments on public lands in-

cluding state parks and forests, scientific and natural areas, wildlife management areas, school trust lands, and Consolidated-Conservation lands, as well as county-managed tax-forfeited lands. Payment rates vary according to land type and generally range from \$2 per acre, to three-quarters of 1% of appraised value.

Rural health leaders share recommendations to boost mental health care in Greater Minnesota

New loan forgiveness opportunities

announced for mental health professionals

One of the challenges highlighted by the COVID-19 pandemic has been the need to boost access to mental health care in many areas of Minnesota. This challenge can be particularly daunting in the less populated areas of Greater Minnesota, but a blueprint for positive change is now available thanks to a group of mental health professionals and other stakeholders who started working on the access issue even before the pandemic started.

For the first time, licensed drug and alcohol counselors are now eligible for Minnesota's state-run loan forgiveness program. This is just the sort of strategy endorsed in a new report by the Rural Health Advisory Committee that includes recommendations for strengthening mental health care in rural Minnesota.

to ensure everyone in Minnesota can access quality care when they need it. This report is an encouraging step toward that goal.

In May 2019 the Rural Health Advisory Committee formed a workgroup to assess mental health care in rural Minnesota. The work group convened six times from 2019 to 2020 and hosted three regional listening sessions to learn from rural communities in different parts of the state.

Those in Greater Minnesota often lack access to critical mental health services, due in part to an insufficient mental health workforce with a ratio of 1,518 people to each mental health provider in isolated rural areas as compared to 304 people per provider in metropolitan areas.

The committee found that Minnesota has made positive strides in recent years, such as since 2018 mobile crisis services were made available in all Minnesota counties 24 hours a day, seven days a week. However, there are still challenges to address, the report Recommendations on Mental Strengthening Health makes recommendations across four categories: Increasing awareness

• Strengthening the rural mental health care

· Supporting collaboration among stakeholders.

The committee recommends programs that communities can implement, such as Mental Health First Aid, which is a skills-based course that trains people to identify, understand and respond to signs of mental illness. Helpful policies that are also recommended include those that could expand access to care by increasing investments in transportation and broadband initiatives, which

To raise awareness, the report recommends promoting the National Suicide Prevention Line and the Minnesota Crisis Text Line. 2019 The Minnesota Legislature allocated funds so Minnesota callers seeking support through the National Prevention Lifeline now receive fast, localized support due to the opening of four new call centers oper-

would support telehealth.

ating in Minnesota. To expand the workforce, the committee calls for efforts, recruitment decreasing barriers to training, greater mental health collaboration in primary care and extending the careers of retiring workers. There is also a need for more in-patient psychiatric beds, housing programs, youth services and schoollinked mental health servic-

On the workforce front, MDH is implementing some new initiatives. This year, the Minnesota Legislature dedicated an additional \$3 million annually to the Minnesota loan forgiveness program. As part of this expansion, licensed drug and alcohol counselors are now eligible, in addition to physicians and other licensed mental health professionals, including psychologists and social workers. The application period for this program started Sept. 13 and ends Nov. 22. More information is available on the Minnesota Health Care Loan Forgiveness Programs web-

site.
MDH is also working on another initiative to help get more mental health practitioners licensed as professionals. Due to barriers, less than 50% of mental health students who get their master's degree secure professional license required to offer therapy independently. For example, one hurdle can be meeting the licensing requirement that requires a period of on-the-job training under supervision by a licensed mental health supervisor.

MDH is developing a program for supporting wouldbe supervisors from communities of color by providing them the financial or other support they need to become supervisors so they can train other mental health practitioners seeking a professional license. MDH is working on the details of the program and hopes to have it up and running by early next year.



How to start teaching manners

The very best place to start teaching manners is in the home. When adults are respectful to each other and to children, they are modeling good manners and setting an example much louder than words. As important as a good model is, it is not enough. Children do not automatically pick up all the nuances of civilized behavior. Examples must be backed by explanation and instruction.

Children need to be told exactly what is expected of them. It is useless to expect them to act like miniature adults, but only by knowing the rules can they follow them. A fun way to learn rules is to play games, for example, a pretend tea party. Act out a proper greeting (Hello, Mrs. Bear. How

you?") and proper table manners ("Would you like some cookies? Please pass the milk. Thank you very much.") A child can "teach" her doll how a good guest acts and in the pretending, reinforce her own good

One instruction is not enough. Reminders are necessary over and over again. Friendly reminders work better than hostile ones. Ask pleasantly: "What do you



Making organic certification more affordable

Rebates now available to Minnesota farms and handlers

Minnesota organic farmers and processors can apply for a rebate of up to 50 percent of the cost of their organic certification. The Minnesota Department of Agriculture is accepting applications for the Minnesota Organic Cost Share Program through Nov. 1, 2021.

Organic certification is a third-party verification system. İt assures consumers the organic products they buy are produced in accordance with federal organic regulations. Organic operations must follow National Organic Standards and are monitored through review of their records and on-site inspections at least once a

'The yearly cost of certification can range from a few hundred to several thousand dollars," MDA Assistant Commissioner Patrice Bailey said. "This program provides some relief and goes a long way to make organic certification more afford-

program come from a cooperative agreement with the United States Department of Agriculture Farm Service Agency (USDA-FSA). Operations that received certification (or had ongoing certification) between Oct. 1, 2020 and Sept. 30, 2021 are eligible for reimbursement of up to 50 percent of certification-related expenses.

The maximum rebate available is \$500 per category (crop, livestock, processing/handling, wild harvest). The MDA also offers a similar cost share program for transitioning to organic.

To qualify, applicants must be certified organic by a USDA-accredited certifying agency. The MDA has already mailed application packets to all certified organic operations in the

Any certified organic farmer or processor who did not receive a packet can obtain all the program details and necessary materials on the Organic Certification Cost-Share Program page of the MDA's website or by calling 651-201-6134. Applicants that do not wish to apply with MDA may apply through their local USDA-FSA Office.

Prior exposure to conflicting health information reduces receptivity to messages about widely recommended health behaviors

University of Minnesota researchers are finding that prior exposure to conflicting health information reduces receptivity to messages about widely-recommended health behaviors.

Today's public information environment is characterized by conflicting information about a wide range of health topics, including nutrition, cancer screening, e-cigarettes and, most recently, COVID-19. Research has shown exposure to conflicting information can negatively affect public understanding and trust in health recommenda-

What is not known is whether such exposure might make people less receptive to other health messages, including those about widely recommended health behaviors for which there is little conflict, such as fruit and vegetable consumption and physical activity. The possibility of such "carryover effects" from exposure to conflicting information was recently tested by an inter-disciplinary team of Univer-Minnesota

researchers. Published in the journal Annals of Behavioral Medicine, the U of M study involved a three-wave, online survey experiment with a representative sample of nearly 3,000 U.S. adults during the summer of 2020. Participants were randomly assigned to view a series of health news stories and social media posts about six different health topics including mammography screening and carbohydrate consumption. These stories and posts, which were shown to participants twice over a month-long period, differed only in whether they featured conflict over scientific evidence or guidance. At least one week after their second viewing, participants were asked to evaluate ads from several recent health campaigns about behaviors for which there is broad scientific consensus: fruit and vegetable consumption, physical activity, and colorectal cancer screen-

Results showed that prior exposure to conflicting health information rendered people less receptive to messages about these widely recommended health behav-

• Those who were previously exposed to conflict reported greater resistance to the health campaign ads, as well as lower perceptions of the health behaviors featured in those ads.

Statistical analysis indicated that carryover eflargely operated through people's feelings of backlash toward health recommendations and research in general, which was elicited by their prior exposure to conflict.

"These results are worrisome, particularly given a COVID-19 information landscape that is increasingly fraught with seemingly conflicting science, as our team's past research has shown," said Rebekah shown," said Rebekah Nagler, study lead and an associate professor in the Hubbard School of Journalism and Mass Communication, and a Masonic Cancer Center member. "Ultimately, people's cumulative, routine exposure to conflicting information about COVID-19 and other health issues could threaten the success of media campaigns and other public health messaging strategies—strategies that we as a country invest in heavily year after year to prevent cancer and other chronic diseases."

Nagler and her colleagues are now thinking about how to intervene and interrupt the carryover phenomenon and better communicate with the public about evolving science.

This research was supported by a grant from the National Cancer Institute.





DNR certifies Northern Pike, Muskie records

catch-and-release record northern pike, a 46 1/4 inch fish caught June 19 on Basswood Lake by Brecken Kobylecky, a 15year-old from Geneva, Illinois. The previous record was a 45 1/4 inch northern pike caught on the Rainy River in 2018.

The record pike was the biggest fish Kobylecky had ever caught. He was fishing with an Ely-based fishing guide and with about 10 minutes left of their final day fishing, they were trolling for pike.

"We hooked onto a huge pike that was barely hooked, and could hardly land it due to the sheer size and weight of the fish," Kobylecky said.

Once the fish was in the boat, they carefully took a few photos and measured the pike before releasing the fish back to the open water.

"The whole experience went by in a flash, but it was an experience of a lifetime I'll never forget," Kobylecky

Angler ties state record for catch-andrelease muskie

The DNR certified a 57 1/4 inch muskie caught July 23 on Lake Vermilion by Todd Kirby of Hudson, Wis., as tied with a 2019 muskie also caught on Lake Vermilion.

With two Vermilion Lake muskies now tied for the state record, this wellknown water body continues to prove itself as a top muskie fishing destination. Kirby had fished the lake a handful of times and was familiar with small pockets

that muskie seem to inhabit. "That Friday night, we were up against the weather. There was a huge storm front moving through creatditions. The humidity was high, and storm clouds were building. It was one of those nights that the fish seemed to be super active, our boat had multiple chases, one resulting in a 48 inch fish in the net — at that time my personal best," Kirby said.

They continued fishing into the night and around 10:30 p.m., he had a large "thud" hit his line hard when his bait was no more than 15 yards from the boat.

"I compared it to reeling in a large moving 'log' and after a few dark splashes, she was in the net. Everything just happened so fast," Kirby said.

Kirby and fishing partners John and Will Gavic thought the fish looked 50 inches and were amazed seeing they caught a fish even longer, and one that would earn state record sta-

"My bait just so happened to be the one that she ate, but that whole night couldn't have been possible without the help of John Gavic and Will Gavic. Muskie fishing is a team effort, and when you have a good team on your side, landing a fish of that caliber creates a memory of a life-

time," Kirby said. Perch: disappearing or getting smaller? Research underway

Yellow perch are more than great table fare. They're an important Minnesota fish species as forage for predators such as walleye and as a targeted

The DNR has survey yellow perch for decades. The data shows a statewide decrease in catch over time.

Perch are very adaptable to different environmental conditions and populations can look very different from lake to lake, with some containing mostly smaller fish and others having destination trophy fisheries.

Standard nets used during population sampling only collect yellow perch larger than five inches so it is unknown if overall populations are decreasing or if populations are shifting to smaller individuals. Interestingly, research has shown that in some Minnesota lakes, yellow perch can live out their entire life cycle without reaching five inches in length.

A collaborative research project is underway to develop methods for more effectively sampling of yellow perch two inches long and larger and describe the range of population types that exist in lakes throughout Minnesota. These results will be used in future research to understand the fish community and environmental factors that shape yellow perch popula-

Friday, Gov. Tim Walz announced a \$10 million drought relief package to support Minnesota farmers and livestock producers impacted by severe drought conditions during the 2021 growing season.

"Historic drought conditions have created extreme stress and financial hardship for our farmers and livestock producers during an already difficult time for the agricultural industry," said Walz. "As governor, and as someone who grew up on a family farm, I stand with our farmers. This funding will provide muchneeded relief to Minnesota's agricultural community and help ensure our farmers can keep feeding Minnesota and the world.'

"Minnesota's farmers are essential to our economy and to our communities, Lt.Gov. Peggy

Flanagan. "As we've traveled the state and heard directly from farmers, small and large, we know how critical relief is for families across Minnesota. This proposal provides meaningful support for our farmers and producers who have been now will help keep families hit hard by this year's on the farm." severe drought

"Thanks to the governor's drought relief package, Minnesota's livestock and specialty crop farmers will have an opportunity to recoup some of their losses,' said Minnesota Department of Agriculture Commissioner Thom Petersen. "I encourage farmers and producers to apply for these grants and loans while they're available."
"We're grateful to see the

governor take action toward providing swift, targeted relief to farmers who've been devastated by this historic drought," said Gary Wertish, president of the Minnesota Farmers Union. "Many livestock and specialty crop producers are struggling to plan for winter and upcoming season. Any relief we can get out

The proposal includes \$5 million in rapid response grants to provide drought relief for livestock producers and specialty crop producers. Examples of eligible costs include water handling equipment such as water tanks, pipeline, and water wagons, water hauling, wells, and irrigation equipment.

The funding proposal also includes \$5 million for Rural Finance the Authority's Disaster Recovery Loan Program. The Rural Finance The Finance Authority's Disaster

Recovery Loan Program makes zero-interest loans available immediately for Minnesota farmers whose operations are suffering from lack of rain. The Disaster Recovery Loan Program can be used to help cover lost revenue or expenses not covered by

More details on the drought relief package will be announced soon.

This summer, Walz met with agricultural leaders across the state to hear how the drought has impacted them. Walz also met with President Joe Biden and USDA Secretary Vilsack to ask that all levels of government work together to address the impacts of this drought on Minnesota's farmers.

Workforce crisis exists in nearly every nursing and assisted living facility

The American Health Association National Center Living Assisted (AHCA/NCAL) released a survey of nursing home and assisted living providers across the U.S. Results from the survey highlight an urgent need for Congress to address the workforce crisis facing the long term care industry.

Key findings include: 86 percent of nursing homes and 77 percent of assisted living providers said their workforce situation has gotten worse over the last three months.

 Nearly every nursing home (99 percent) and assisted living facility (96 percent) in the U.S. is facing a staffing shortage. 59 percent of nursing homes and nearly one-third of assisted living providers are experiencing a high level of

staffing shortages. • More than 7 out of 10 nursing homes and assisted living communities said a lack of qualified candidates and unemployment benefits have been the biggest obsta-

cles in hiring new staff. Due to these shortages, nearly every nursing home and assisted living community is asking staff to work overtime or extra shifts. Nearly 70 percent of nursing homes are having to hire expensive agency staff. 58 percent of nursing homes are limiting new admissions.

78 percent of nursing homes and 61 percent of assisted living facilities are concerned workforce challenges might force them to close. More than one-third of nursing homes are very concerned about having to shut down their facility(ies).

The survey underscores the severity of the crisis and the need for immediate action from Congress. Data from the Bureau of Labor Statistics shows nursing homes and other residential care facilities have lost 380,000 employees since February 2020. As many caregivers are getting burned out by the pandemic, many providers don't have the financial means to offer competitive wages, resulting in workers leaving the field for jobs in other health care settings or other industries altogether.

The consequences of letting this crisis go unsolved are significant. Stories of nursing homes restricting new patients or shutting down completely because there aren't enough workers have made headlines in recent weeks. The longterm care labor crisis ultimately limits access to care for vulnerable seniors.

Without help from lawmakers, more workforce-related closures could occur, uprooting frail residents and their family members.

The reconciliation package under consideration in Congress is an appropriate vehicle to address chronic staffing challenges. AHCA and LeadingAge have proposed several solutions to strengthen the long term care workforce in the Care for Our Seniors Act, including assistance programs for caregivers through tax credits, loan forgiveness and childcare, as well as incentives for higher learning institutions to train the next generation of health care heroes. Federal resources for these long-Federal term solutions as well as proper funding for Medicaid could go a long way to lifting up our frontline caregivers while preparing for a growing elderly population.

Lawmakers cannot miss this opportunity to invest in the long term care workforce and give providers the resources they need to attract and retain staff. A strong workforce will help prevent closures and ensure current and future long term care residents have access to the high-quality care they deserve.

We're engaging with Minnesota Tribes and creating opportunities for their citizens and communities to benefit.
