\$800,000 committed to Chief's Coulee project

Drainageway west of golf club addressed

It's been at least two years in the making, but the City of Thief River Falls continues to move forward with the Chief's Coulee project. At its meeting Tuesday, April 16, the Thief River Falls City Council approved committing \$800,000 to the estimated \$2 million project meant to reduce flooding along Chief's Coulee and improve the quality of water discharged into the Red Lake River from the coulee.

In August 2022, the City of Thief River Falls agreed to partner with the Red Lake Watershed District for the project on the north side of the city. Since then, the groups have been obtaining funding for the project and determining the scope. Water Systems Superintendent Wayne Johnson said all of the surveying has been completed, and the groups are waiting for approval from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

Chief's Coulee is a drainageway that moves water from an area west of Highway 32 near the Thief River Golf Club. Water then flows past Thief River Falls Radio and Dewey Avenue, eventually making its way to Eighth Street and Red Robe Park. At the park, water out-

lets into the Red Lake River. Chief's Coulee has been beset by drainage issues, water quality problems and foul odors. The channel isn't large enough to accommodate all of the water making its way through Chief's

As part of the project, the groups plan to divert some agricultural runoff north of County Ditch 70, regrade the coulee, properly size the culverts and install water quality improvement structures. It is expected that the

project will reduce flooding along the coulee and improve water quality before the water enters the Red Lake River near Red Robe

While the city and RLWD have secured grants, they will each contribute \$800,000 to the project. Mayor Brian Holmer said bonding will cover the city's portion.

In an interview with The Times, Johnson said that the project may start as soon as this year. He estimated the

project will cost \$1.8 million to \$2.2 million.

The council approved plans and specifications for the locally-funded portion of the 2024 Streets and Utilities Improvement Project. Estimated to cost \$1.4 million, that portion of the project includes:

Improvements Kendall Avenue and utilities from First to Third streets

Improvements to Crocker Avenue North and (Continued on Page 12)

Council supports funding request for apartments

Late applications for liquor licenses frustrates city

Thief River Falls needs more apartments, and the Thief River Falls City Council is trying to help. At a special council meeting Friday, April 19, the council approved a resolution supporting a firm's request for state

funding.

DW Jones hopes to build

Edge Housing LLC south of Valley Assisted Living. It plans to purchase the property from MAK Properties, which had initially planned to construct a multi-use building there. DW Jones plans to build a three-story apartment building featuring 66 market-rate units on the property at 701 Hwy. 32 S. The project is estimated to cost \$13.9 million. However, DW Jones' plans are contingent on funding from the Workforce Housing Development Program. The program provides an unsecured, zero-interest, threedeferred forgivable vear loan.

On Friday, the council provided its support for DW Jones to use a nine-year Tax Increment Financing District already created for the property for the required local match. Richard Baker,

city economic/community development director, said the TIF district is projected to generate a net of \$950,672, allowing DW Jones to leverage an additional \$1,901,344 from the program. He indicated that a private equity low-interest loan will be also be utilized for the project, leading to a total of \$4,301,344 in loans from Minnesota Housing. Baker said that amounts to 31% of

the project cost.

The council called the special meeting Friday since it was waiting for final cost estimates three days earlier at its regular council meeting. DW Jones' loan application is due Tuesday, April 30. The council has already approved rezoning the property back to Multi-Family Residential District (R-4). Rezoning is also contigent on the state funding request.

Baker indicated there was only one vacant apartment in Thief River Falls among 225 apartments surveyed in March. He said he had been informed that DigiKey planned to hire 50 to 60 temporary employees before May. As of Monday, DigiKey had 240 open positions.

The council approved a temporary intoxicating liquor license for American Legion Post 117. The license will enable the Legion to provide liquor at a wedding reception May 25-26 at the Curling Club.

Fargo man charged with selling meth to informant

A Fargo, N.D., man has been charged in Pennington County District Court after he allegedly sold methamphetamine to an informant in January in Thief River

John James Nogowski, 35, has been charged with felony third degree controlled substance crime sale. A warrant has been issued for his arrest. The complaint was filed Friday, April 19. The charge stemmed

from a Jan. 25 communication between a Pine to Prairie Drug Task Force officer and a confidential, informant. According to the complaint, informant said Nogowski had meth to sell. Under the PTPDTF officer's

arranged to buy some meth from Nogowski for \$600 in East Grand Forks. A short time later, Nogowski arranged to meet the informant in the 200 block of LaBree Ave. N. in Thief River Falls. The informant was provided an audio recording and transmitting device. At about 3:37 a.m., the transaction was completed. Besides Nogowski, two other people were at that location.

The informant allegedly provided a baggie of meth, a white pill and a blue pen with a small bag inside of it to the PTPDTF officer. Nogowski allegedly sold 10.131 grams of meth to the informant for \$400. The remaining \$200 in drug-buy

funds were given back to the PTPDTF.

Prior to providing the meth to the informant, Nogowski allegedly took 1.75 grams of meth for himself and he provided 3.5 grams to one of the other individuals. That person allegedly gave the informant the pen containing a small bag of meth so that the informant could provide it to a third individual. That individual also gave the informant the white pill, which was a hydrocodone pill. The informant pretended to take the pill and kept it to provide it later to law enforcement.

The informant positively identified a picture of Nogowski as the person who sold the meth.





> County Deputy Scott Mekash's assistance in locating and arresting Fowler at about 9:52 a.m.
> Tuesday, April 16. The former sheriff's office was seeking Fowler for a harassment order violation involving the Thief River Falls woman. A Marshall County deputy had attempted to arrest Fowler at

his home; however, Fowler allegedly slammed the door in the deputy's face. He refused to go with the deputy and said something to the effect that the deputy needed to get other law enforcement officers. The deputy left to discuss how to handle the matter and wait for backup. Shortly afterward, Boman

informed Mekash Pennington deputies and Thief River Falls police officers who began searching for Fowler. The complaint indicated that Mekash "was aware of Fowler from past investigations and the fact that his behavior had been growing increasingly bizarre and unpredictable recently." He also knew that Fowler had allegedly violated the harassment restraining order multiple times. Mekash also knew that Fowler "had been posting various social media videos/posts and that some of the videos/posts contained very disturbing and concerning sexual fantasies and ideologies." Some had been about the woman.

About eight minutes after Boman's phone call, a Pennington County deputy located Fowler's vehicle traveling north on Main Avenue in Thief River Falls. At the time, Mekash happened to be near the interlearned that Fowler had section with Eighth Street driven away from the home. driving the vehicle. He attempted to conduct a traffic stop, but Fowler allegedly fled with Mekash and the other deputy in pursuit. Fowler traveled a circuitous route involving Knight Avenue, Third Street, Main Avenue, Second Street, LaBree Avenue, Third Street again, Highway 59 and then Greenwood Street. The complaint indicated that he traveled about 60 to 65 mph on Third Street.

While in pursuit, Mekash requested that other law enforcement officers go to the woman's home in the 2100 block of Greenwood St. E. since he was afraid Fowler would attempt to go there. None were able to make it there in time. At some point, the Marshall County Sheriff's Office informed the woman that Fowler may be attempting to drive to her home.

Since law enforcement feared Fowler would act violently toward the woman if he got into her home, the decided officers Mekash would cut off his


The charge stemmed from an April 10, 2023 report of an assault near the intersection of First Street and St. Paul Avenue in Thief River Falls, according to the complaint. The police report and complaint indicated that Moore knocked a 36-year-old Thief River Falls man off of his bicycle at about 3:05 p.m. and punched him three or more times in the face. He accused the man of stealing tools from Moore. The man

denied stealing the tools. An ambulance transported the man to Sanford Medical Center in Thief River Falls. The man suffered a "displaced fracture involving the left lateral orbital floor, a mildly displaced fracture involving the left lateral orbital wall,

involving the anterior and lateral wall of the left maxillary sinus as well as the left zygomatic arch." The police investigator learned the man would need to undergo reconstructive surgery once the swelling had

subsided. A person had seen a man, later identified as Moore, jump out of a Suburban and

physically assault another man. A Pine to Prairie Drug Task Force officer was the first to respond, finding bloody man with a swollen face. It was apparent he was in a great deal of pain, and he had trouble speaking. However, man identified



complaint indicated that Moore was on supervised probation at the time for a second degree controlled substance crime in Morrison County. The Thief River Falls field office is supervising him.

Shortly afterward, a deputy located the suspect vehicle. He learned the two occupants had dropped Moore off at his apartment at Parkwood Apartments, 624 Kinney Ave. N. At about 4 p.m., a police sergeant and a police investigator went to Moore's apartment. Upon answering the door, Moore, who appeared nervous and upset, asked if he was in trouble. When told police were investigating an assault, he denied involvement. However, Moore said there were some other

Moore was transported to the Law Enforcement Center. Once there, he declined to speak with police. However, Moore continued to talk, speaking about "wrongs done to him in the past" and how he had a bad opinion of the victim. "Moore was mad that law enforcement would take the victim's words over his own. While in the booking room, Moore stated that he hated the victim even more now and stated it 'wasn't over' and that he was 'going to be

smarter about it next time. Law enforcement also spoke to the two people who were riding with Moore in the Suburban prior to the assault. Both denied seeing the assault. The driver said the three of them were on their way home from a shopping trip when Moore told her to stop the vehicle. After the woman stopped the vehicle, Moore got out and she could hear him say the other man's name. She said she could hear arguing. Afterward, he got back into the Suburban and they

drove home. Brian Wyman Wilde, 61, Thief River Falls, was sentenced for a felony offense of felon in possession of a firearm. Wilde was sentenced to 60 months in prison stayed for two years and six months. He was ordered to serve supervised probation for two years and six months. Wilde was ordered to not use or possess firearms, ammunition or explosives. He was ordered to provide a DNA ordered to pay \$210 in fees and fines.



dence. The gun was sent to the Minnesota Bureau of Criminal Apprehension for testing. On June 21, 2021, the BCA lab report indicat-ed that the DNA taken from the shotgun matched an offender in the BCA database – Wilde.

Specifically, the complaint referred to the man saying he didn't allow Wilde or two other men, including one with the first name provided by the victim, to handle the gun. He said he had owned the gun for about 20 years and hadn't obtained

Child endangerment places child at risk of harm: On March 29, the Marshall County Social Services Department received a report of child endangerment. The report was later forwarded to the County Pennington Sheriff's Office. Audriana Marie Nunn, 35, Goodridge, has been charged with child endangerment - places child at risk of harm. The complaint was filed April 16. According to the complaint, Nunn allegedly admitted that she had been at the Goodridge Liquor Store for an hour on March 28, consumed a couple of drinks and left her 3month-old daughter in her idling car. Three days after the incident, Nunn told the social worker that she was unsure if she checked on the baby while she spent time at the bar. She indicated it was "kind of a fog' for her.' A sheriff's deputy reviewed surveillance video, seeing Nunn had been there for about two hours from 9:29 p.m. to 11:42 p.m. The deputy noted it appeared that Nunn had left for three minutes to move her vehicle down the street. She allegedly appeared to con-

The deputy interviewed Nunn on April 9, when she allegedly admitted leaving the baby in the vehicle for more than two hours while she was drinking at the bar. She "agreed that she was intoxicated to the point that she should not have been driving with her infant in the vehicle." Nunn allegedly admitted leaving the baby unsupervised at her Marshall County home two other times in the past when she had left to drink at the bar.





For those impacted by an accident, abuse, disaster or neglect, the pain is real, and it can strike at any moment. Our desire is to bring hope to those who are struggling by helping them surround themselves with the tools and techniques that bring lasting impact.'

Retired physician Tim Rittenour will serve as the local MindFit host, guiding group discussion and providing support. He invites those who may be suffering from trauma or struggling



Times for Toddlers ...

Teaching children to take care of things

Most parents have a goal of teaching their children to be responsible and to take care of themselves and their possessions. So then the question is how soon can we start working toward this

As soon as children start to imitate their parents, they are able to begin in small ways to work toward this goal. Once again your example will be very impor-tant. Young children love to imitate. So if they see you hang your coat up very time you take it off, they will most likely want to hang theirs up. If they see you put magazines and all other reading material on a shelf (or some similar place), they will probably put their books on a shelf with little or no encouragement.

At first you will probably have to do a lot of encouraging and/or reminding. But it will be worth it in the long run. Here are some simple rules that you can teach your young child:

Put away one toy (or activity) before you take out

another. Books are for looking at, not writing in.

Crayons or markers are used on paper, not on

tables or walls When children have a clear understanding of where their toys or posses-

sions belong, such as a toy shelf, box or closet, it is easier for them to clean up.

Instead of commanding children to put their toys away, watch how children respond to suggestions that sound like a game, such as: How quickly can you put all the markers into the

• I'll pick up the cars while you pick up the trucks. When parents pitch in and help kids clean up, not only does the job get done

more quickly, but it teaches youngsters to help parents. (Contributed by the Early Childhood Family Education Department of School District 564.)

SOMETHING TO TALK ABOUT

Be specific when talking to your young child. The statement, "Pick up your toys" is too vague. A young child may not know what you mean. Also if they have a big "mess," it may be too overwhelming. It's better to say, "Put all the books on the shelf." Then when that is complete, you can assign the next task.

How to really learn that language

Have you ever wanted to earn a language? You may have downloaded a few apps, tried some online courses, or even taken a few classes. Oftentimes these efforts bear little fruit. Children, however, appear to learn languages effortlessly. Children are primed to learn the different phonemes (units of sound) of their native tongue from a young age. However, all hope is not lost if you are an adult. The important thing to keep in mind is that children learn almost entirely through immersion. This process is called language acquisition and happens continuously as we immerse in the lan-

The easiest way to immerse ourselves is by watching YouTube videos or TV shows in the language you want to learn. Try to choose media that will be simpler to understand, while still engaging (Í recommend Bluey!). Do not ever turn on the English subtitles. This will ruin your ability to immerse yourself in the language as you will only be reading the subtitles instead of trying to understand. You can also listen to podcasts or music in the language while you are doing chores or are driving.

Without subtitles, you might notice that you understand basically nothing. We learn more from immersion when we understand some of what we are hearing, we can understand more by adding more context. We do this by learning more about the language, especially the vocabulary. One way is to look up words you hear in a dictionary. This will require you to pay special attention to the rules behind how to read and write the language. You can use apps like Duolingo or Babbel for learning vocabulary and grammar, but I recommend using Language Transfer because the course gives you a more complete picture of how the language works and how people actually use it. It is important to keep in mind that these tools are not the way you learn the language, they

just make it easier. The way you learn is immersion.

Once you are able to understand a fair bit of the language, you can try reading. Reading is a very powerful form of input. The main benefit to reading is that you can stop and start and take as much time trying to understand as you could need. You can also combine reading with listening if you find audio that matches your reading material. If you can't find audio that goes with what you are reading, make sure to use a tool like forvo.com to find the native pronunciation of any words or phrases you are unsure about. Forvo is great because it crowdsources pronunciations from real people, allowing you to hear how a real native speaker pronounces the words.

Once you understand what people are saying, it doesn't take long to start speaking. Depending on the language, you are learning you can find people in your community to talk to. Otherwise you can use apps like HelloTalk or Tandem for finding conversation partners. If you aren't comfortable talking in the language yet, you can start by talking to yourself throughout your day or into a mirror. The important thing is to remember that no one is going to judge you for making an effort to learn their language.

Now that you understand that, even though you are over the age of 5, all hope is not lost, you can apply this knowledge to finally learn that language. Your experience in the world can make learning easier since you aren't starting from scratch. Remember that learning through immersion is really the only way to learn, but you can make it easier by learning more about the language. Duolingo probably won't make you fluent, but watching Bluey might!

Did You Know?

The number of bachelor's degrees awarded by colleges and universities has increased considerably in the 21st century. Popular college majors among today's students

College students' choice of majors can set them on a path toward rewarding and lucrative careers. Though a career may not be foremost on the minds of students as they graduate high school and inch closer to the start of college, choice of major merits consideration, even among students who have vet to receive their high school diplomas.

Many college students enroll in school as undeclared, while others may pick a major without realizing what it requires and which career path it might set them on. That might explain why it's so common for college students to switch majors. Though data indicating how many students switch majors is somewhat dated, one study from the U.S. Department of Education indicated about one in five students changed their majors at least once while pursuing a bachelor's degree. With that in mind, students may want to consider some popular majors as they try to determine which path to take in college. According to the National Center for Education Statistics, more than half of the 2.1 million bachelor's degrees awarded at US colleges and universities in the 2020-21 school year were concentrated in six fields of study. In addition, the NCES reports that the following are the six most popular degrees from that academic year.

1. Business: Almost one in bachelor's degrees awarded in 2020-21 were in the field of business.

2. Health professions: This field accounted for 13 percent of all bachelor's degrees awarded in 2020-21. Common specializations include health sciences, health care administration, nursing, and sports medicine.

3. Social sciences and history: NCES data indicates nearly one in 10 students majored in a social science in 2020-21. This includes specializations such as history, political science and socio-

4. Engineering: Demand for engineers is expected to rise in the coming decades, and that should bode well

for the 126,000 students who earned bachelor's degrees in engineering in 2020-21.

5. Biological and biomedical sciences: Bachelor's degrees awarded in biological and biomedical sciences increased by 46 percent between the 2010-11 and 2020-21 school years.

6. Psychology: NCES data indicates degrees in psychology accounted for 6 percent of all bachelor's degrees awarded in 2020-21.

This new, innovative program is a hybrid, year-long, statewide course designed for those who work with farmers including crop advisors, consultants, educators, agency personnel, agronomists, ag lenders, and personnel at non-profits, soil and water conservation districts (SWCD) and Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) offices.

This unique opportunity will take a deep dive into cover crops and will be tailored to Minnesota cropping systems and conditions. We will address the challenges and opportunities associated with using cover crops in Minnesota and attendees will be able to participate in research trials members develop to help address some of the unknowns around cover crops.

The academy will kick off with in-person meetings at the Research and Outreach Centers (ROC) in Lamberton, Waseca, and Crookston in June 2024 (attend the site nearest to you). You will visit cover crop research plots and learn about what is and is not working in your region. Topics will include developing a cover crop plan, weed management and cover crop termination best practices, soil fertility considerations, avoiding cash crop issues, and getting started with cover crops. The Minnesota Farm and Rural Helpline is open to anyone who is struggling with stress, anxiety, or depression. Calls are answered 24/7 by trained counselors who can lend a

listening ear or connect you with help for business, financial, or legal problems. Call 833-600-2670 or text "FARMSTRESS" to 898211 to get started.

If you or someone you know is dealing with a crisis caused by either a natural disaster or financial problems, contact one of the Farm MDA's nine Advocates. They know all about agricultural lending practices, mediation, lender negotiation, farm programs, crisis counseling, disaster programs, and to recognize the need for legal and/or social services.

Minnesota also has Ted Matthews and Monica McConkey, experienced, agfocused mental health providers who offer confidential counseling services at no cost to farm individuals, couples, or families anywhere in the state. Sessions can take place in person, on Zoom, or over the phone, and insurance is not needed. They have helped hundreds of Minnesota farmers and farm family members over the years.

For financial assistance, the Rural Finance Authority (RFA) provides a variety of low-interest loans, including one for disaster relief. The MDA also posts a number of grant opportunities throughout the year, such as the AGRI Livestock Investment Grant, which can help improve, update, and modernize livestock operation infrastructure and equipment

Specific to dairy farms, Dairy Business Planning Grants cover 50% of your cost to hire a qualified, independent third party to create a business plan for your operation or test for stray voltage. Dairy Profit Teams provide planning and problem-solving services throughout Minnesota.

Fischbach introduces Stop Executive Overreach

This week, Congresswoman Michelle Fischbach (MN-07) introduced H.R. 7983, the Stop Executive Overreach on Trade Agreements Act, which passed through the Ways and Means Committee today with a (25-16) vote.

"The Biden administration has been bypassing congressional authority and as a result they are making flimsy, band-aid agreements that hurt our economic security, our national security, and the taxpayers' wallets." said Fischbach.
"My bill returns authority back to Congress where it belongs. It incentivizes domestic producers, thoughtful strengthens trade partnerships, and saves taxpayers \$109 million. I am grateful to my colleagues for supporting this common-sense legislation."

Chairman Jason Smith said, "The Biden administration must not be allowed to continue sidestepping Congress with fake, ad hoc critical mineral agreements that have no legislative support or enforceability. This legislation stops the executive branch from overstepping and makes clear that the only trade agreements that qualify for the Inflation Reduction Act's domestic sourcing requirement are approved those Congress. I am thankful to Rep. Fischbach for introducing this legislation.

Background: The Biden administration rushed to $_{
m the}$ Inflation Reduction Act and now House Republicans are having to manage the repercussions. This legislation required critical minerals in electric vehicles be sourced domestically or from a Free Trade Agreement (FTA) partner in order to qualify for its generous electric vehicle tax credit. However, administration

found these requirements too constraining and chosen to bypass congressional authority. Instead of making thoughtful, enforceable, and congressionally-ratified trade agreements, they are making short-sighted agreements to cover their short-sighted plan and it is discouraging both domestic development as well as meaningful international partnerships. The Stop Executive Overreach on Trade Agreements Act clearly defines FTA and only allows minerals sourced domestically or by FTA partners to benefit from the tax credit. This will incentivize the mining and processing of critical minerals here at home, open foreign markets to American-made products and U.S. agriculture, and save taxpayers \$109 mil-

Graduation as measure

I don't recall having a choice of graduating on time. I remember expressing some independence at about that age, but being told rather emphatically the only way I wasn't going to graduate on time, is if I graduated early and with good grades. And, I was told, "Good luck with getting a job and making enough to support yourself." That, and a parttime job, quickly quashed my ego and adolescent brush with independence. My parents did care. They wanted to make sure I had the best education I could get.

The graduation rate has become a topic of discussion and measure for whether teachers and schools are doing their job. Making graduation rates the responsibility of educators has always been a bit alarming to me.

What keeps kids engaged enough to complete their high school education?

In a news release last week from the Minnesota Department of Education, the 2023 graduation rate was 83.3% or 58,293 graduates, which represents a 0.3 percentage point decrease in the fouryear graduation rate compared to the class of 2022. According to the same news release, in

2023, 3,874 students from earlier classes also earned their diplomas, graduating five, six or seven years after beginning high school. I guess these statistics were enough to set off some hand-wringing.

Even with this news, the graduation rate for most schools in northwestern Minnesota is 90% or higher. Does that mean our educators and schools are better? Does that mean our parents are better parents? Does that mean our students come from one predominate demographic group (white)? Does that mean different demographic groups value education differently? What does it mean?

The concern I have is that it can mean so many different things that it's not a very good measure or indicator of success.

I'm not saying we shouldn't be discussing it. We should be aware of and discuss why some kids choose not to attend school or complete high school on time. And, to my way of thinking, it also means we need to talk to the kids and parents. Every kid has a unique story. We should be making sure they understand it is not only important for what they need to know nd succeed in life, but that it's important for our communities, too.

Starting school

We were talking about preschool and kindergarten the other day. My first introduction to school was kind of a preschool class offered privately to about 15 kids. I recall feeling like I was just taking up space. I was baffled as to why I was there and what was going on.

They didn't introduce kindergarten in our public schools until the year I started first grade. Of course, my younger brother got to go. He got to do a lot of things, including take naps, which I thought was just the coolest.

Today, many public schools have preschools - classes for children ages 3 and up. It's a

Taking public notices for schools out of newspapers would hurt the public more than schools

A significant discussion is taking place at the state Legislature in reaction to the recent announcement that eight community newspapers will close at the end of the month.

Under a proposal in the Senate Education Policy Omnibus bill (SF 3567), school districts would no longer be required to publish their proceedings in newspapers and could instead move them to their own websites.


We believe the proposal, which is backed by the Minnesota School Boards Association, is a knee-jerk reaction made too quickly after the announcement about the southwest metro newspapers and does not take into consideration possible solutions.

While there is a possibility some of these newspapers could still be purchased, there is also a law already in place that says if you don't have a legal newspaper in your county, those notices can be placed in a newspaper in an adjoining county. In the case of these newspapers, there is also the possibility of printing notices in the Star Tribune.

We believe that anytime vou start messing with public notices and government transparency, it gets the ball rolling, and we have no doubt it could trickle down to other local government public notices as well.

Public notices are essential in not only helping residents make informed decisions but also in holding local governments accountable for decisions made.

entities Government should not be placing their own notices on their websites for transparency's sake, and it's especially important to point out that the reach of these sites is often substantially less than those of newspapers.



In addition to the print edition, the Tribune and all newspapers that print public notices publish them on their websites in front of the paywall so that any person interested in looking through the notices can do so free of charge. People don't have to buy a newspaper and they don't have to have a subscription to view them. And they are archived there forever, so if someone needs to go back and look through several notices, they will be able to find them.

The notices are also uploaded to mnpublicnotice. com, where the public can search for all of the public notices throughout the state.

urge the Senate We Conference Committee members to work with the Minnesota Newspaper Association, which represents the state's newspapers, on a possible solution to this situation.

Keeping an eye on all the changes to bills

The provision in this bill formerly known as HF945 is very concerning to water trappers and other sports persons alike. The plan would make it extremely difficult for both trappers and law enforcement to know where the property lines are in many waters, especially since some have multiple owners and the property lines aren't square. Plus, it would likely require permission to trap on large paper company lands, like Potlatch, that are currently open to outdoor activities like hunting and trapping.

Currently, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources can classify DNR forest lands as either closed, limited, or managed regarding the use of off highway vehicles. HF3911 includes troubling language for operation of ATVs on state forest land north of U.S. Highway 2, which would include 26 forests. Of those 26, only 12 are currently classified as Managed; 11 are completely or largely classified as Limited: and the remaining two are classified as Closed. The tools currently exist to manage these lands to restrict off-highway operation in those forests where use is significant to warrant

that level of management. Also disappointing is that the proposal only includes limited provisions for the looming feral hog problem possibly on the horizon in northwestern Minnesota, and it does not include any initiatives for wolf management. In fact, the committee chairman refused to even give a legislative hearing to my wolf hunting bill.

Agriculture Omnibus Bill Moves Forward The House agriculture

work on Thursday, and I was glad to see a couple of troubling provisions taken out of the final bill.

Last year, the ag bill included a grain indemnity program to help farmers harmed in the event of a grain elevator failure. Farmers are unlikely to ever be fully compensated for delivered grain if an elevator declares bankruptcy before paying for that grain. That's because it will first be used to pay back creditors who have collateral with the elevator. After those creditors are paid, there's often not enough money remaining to make farmers even partially whole. The idea of the indemnity fund is to limit those significant losses by ensuring there are funds available to compensate

There was an attempt to add a provision in this year's ag bill to divert the interest earned on the grain indemnity funds to debt reduction for farmer's markets that was thankfully amended out of the final product.

Also taken out of the bill was language banning the hatching of birds in schools, which was a provision I highlighted in a previous update. This is not a serious

the dedicated ATV account, committee finished up its ag policy, and I was glad to see common sense finally prevail.

Good Broadband Provisions Included in Ag Bill

The broadband portion of the bill (Article 4) allows the Department of Employment and Economic Development (DEED) to transfer up to \$5 million between these three programs: the border-toborder broadband program, low density population broadband program, and the broadband line extension program. This provision also requires DEED to apply for the federal Digital Equity Capacity Grant Funding.

Klobuchar supports emergency fuel waiver

Sen. Amy Klobuchar (D-MN) released the statement after Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) issued an emergency fuel waiver to allow E15 gasoline, gasoline blended with 15% ethanol, to be sold during the sum-

mer driving season.
"With the peak summer driving season approaching, we need to expand the use of E15 gasoline to improve fuel options at the pump and reduce our reliance on foreign oil," said Klobuchar. "This waiver for summer sales of E15 will do just that, but we must get this done on a permanent basis. I will continue working to establish the year-round use of E15 to bolster our economy, farmers, and national security.'

Klobuchar has long supported legislation to bolster sustainable fuels.

In 2023, Klobuchar and Sen. Deb Fischer (R-NE), both members of the Senate Agriculture Committee, reintroduced bipartisan legislation to make E15 available year round. Consumer and Retailer Choice Act of 2023 would enable the yearround, nationwide sale of ethanol blends higher than 10 percent, helping to lower fuel prices and provide certainty in fuel markets for farmers and consumers.

February Klobuchar led a bipartisan group of lawmakers urging the Biden Administration to act quickly to ensure that the model used to detereligibility

Sustainable Aviation Fuel (SAF) tax credits unlocks the potential held by farmers, ethanol producers, and airlines to reduce carbon emissions from aviation.

In January 2024, Klobuchar, along with Senators Jerry Moran (R-Kan.), Joni Ernst (R-Iowa), Tammy Duckworth (D-IL.) and Chuck Grassley (R-IA), introduced the Farm to Fly Act. Vaccines help reduce the spread of infectious diseases. Without that protection, children are more likely to get measles, RSV, whooping cough and other diseases prevented by vaccines.






