Yellow garbage bag and blue recycling bin services no longer available

Yellow garbage bag and blue recycling bin services are no longer available in the City of Crookston.

On Monday, July 14, city crews noticed that there are yellow garbage bags placed outside. The city has fully transitioned to Waste Management for its garbage and recycling pickup with the last day for the yellow cling bin services Friday, July 11. Yellow garbage bags and blue recycling bins will no longer be picked up by the Public Works Depart-

Residents' options for disposing of garbage and recycling are to use the new service through Waste Management, or bring their

Point of clarification: Clear City of Crookston bags will still be used for yard debris pickup on the second and fourth Monday of the month through October.

TRF native confronts her epilepsy in "Racing Uphill"

As a reporter, Stacia Kalinoski found herself telling other people's stories. What she didn't realize is that she would soon be telling her

own story.
The 2003 Lincoln High School graduate recently published "Racing Uphill: Confronting a Life with Epilepsy." The book delves into her journey with epilepsy and the toll it took on her and her family. "Racing Uphill" also includes insight from prominent epileptologists, who provided information about how seizures can spread, steal memories, and create strange behaviors and mood disorders.

It was a story that Kalinoski initially didn't want to write. "At first, I said, 'No, I can't write a book," she re-

With prodding from others and using various resources, Kalinoski began writing the book during the COVID-19 pandemic. She began writing what she remembered. Epilepsy had robbed her of many memories, but her family and friends, especially fellow LHS graduate Kara Worker, helped fill in the blanks. Eventually, the chapters poured out of her.

According to the Epilepsy Foundation of Minnesota,

"epilepsy is a neurological (brain) condition that causes people to have recurring seizures and is typically diagnosed after two or more unprovoked seizures. Epilepsy is sometimes referred to as a seizure disor-

More than 55,000 Minnesotans have epilepsy. That fact may be a surprise since people don't talk about it, according to Kalinoski. Many adults diagnosed with epilepsy are in denial. Kalinoski said they don't know anyone else with epilepsy and haven't seen someone having a seizure. They may think no one will want to be their friend or want to hire them if others learn they suffer from epilepsy.

The Edina resident's battle with epilepsy began at age 20. At the time, she was

sleeping in her apartment and suffered her first known seizure. Another seizure happened two weeks later. The seizures stopped just as mysteriously as they appeared. Doctors had no idea what triggered the seizures. Kalinoski was prescribed anti-seizure medication.

After Kalinoski competed in the Rock 'n' Roll Seattle Marathon about four years later, the seizures returned. "I couldn't seem to get a hold on them," Kalinoski recalled. She was soon diagnosed with epilepsy and learned she was probably suffering from seizures much longer than anyone had realized.


It is difficult to diagnose epilepsy since seizures are unpredictable and there isn't a blood test for it. At the time, Kalinoski was working as a broadcast journalist in Oregon. She later moved to Michigan, where she accepted a similar job and the seizures continued. It was also where a seizure led to the end of her broadcast career in 2014.

Taking a gamble, Kalinoski soon underwent a series of tests to see if she were a candidate for brain surgery to potentially end the seizures dominating her life. In 2015, Kalinoski underwent resective surgery in which a section of her brain was removed after it was discovered her seizures started in her right temporal lobe. She said she was really lucky to be a candidate for such surgery.

Kalinoski continues to take medication for seizures and continues to suffer from focal aware seizures. However, those seizures are not as intense as those from which she suffered in the past. Someone is conscious and aware of their surroundings during a focal aware seizure. In Kalinoski's case, she will have a metallic taste in her mouth prior to suffering such a seizure. Others may notice a weird smell or a flash of light.

While getting ready for the surgery, Kalinoski was already working on her next project – "Brainstorm," a documentary detailing her battle with epilepsy as well as the battles faced by former University of Minnesota Head Football Coach Jerry Kill and a child who both suffer from epilepsy. "Brainstorm" debuted in 2016 on Twin Cities PBS and has since aired on public television stations nationwide. Kalinoski now serves as an inspirational speaker.

The cause of Kalinoski's epilepsy has never been determined, and no one else in her family has epilepsy. According to the Epilepsy Foundation of Minnesota, "common causes of epilepsy include brain tumor, stroke, head trauma, infections and maternal injuries, but in


Man sentenced for possessing meth in a prohibited zone

A Crookston man was sentenced Thursday, July 10 in Polk County District Court for possessing one or more mixtures of methamphetamine in a prohibited zone in 2023. A charge of felony third degree - sale controlled substance crime was dismissed against Gary Herbert Sundquist, 65.

For the felony charge of third degree controlled substance crime – possession in a prohibited zone, Sundquist was sentenced to 71 months in prison. According to online court documents, he was given credit for 612 days served. Sundquist was ordered to not use or possess firearms, ammunition or explosives for his lifetime. He was ordered to provide a DNA sample. Sundquist was also ordered to pay \$210 in fees and fines.

The charges stemmed from surveillance conducted by a Crookston police detective on Nov. 6, 2023. According to the complaint, he was conducting surveillance in preparation for a probation search at 105 S. Main St., Apt. 11. Avis Ann Studer, 68, lived at that apartment, which is within a block of Mainstreet Courtyard Park. At about 1:50 p.m., the detective observed Sundquist in the parking lot of the apartment complex and enter a car occupied by Wayne Robert Abrahamson, 67. The detective knew Sundquist was on supervised release at the time. The detective followed the

car, which failed to come to a complete stop at the intersection of North Front Street and Sixth Street. He then contacted another Crookston

police officer, who stopped the car. The detective arrived to assist and spoke with Sundquist, who appeared to be under the influence of a controlled substance. Sundquist said he had just left Studer's apartment, where he stayed three times a week. He said he would test positive for marijuana and agreed to a urine test. The urine sample was later found to be positive for the presence of meth, amphetamine and THC (marijuana).

Abrahamson also appeared to be under the influence of a controlled substance. He said he had last used meth two days earlier. Abrahamson told the detective that Sundquist was with him at the time and had provided him with

the meth. He was then arrested. A search warrant was later issued for a blood or urine sample from Abrahamson. It was positive for the presence of meth, amphetamine and THC. He has since been sentenced.

The detective and other officers then went to Studer's apartment. They searched the apartment, finding a broken pen tube in a small storage tote in a bedroom and a white crystallike substance on an end table in the living room. The substance inside the broken pen tube and the substance on the end table both tested positive for the presence of meth. While searching the apartment, officers found male clothing and items con-

taining Sundquist's name. Studer told an officer that

she had last used meth a day or two days earlier in her apartment. She said she found the meth in her sock drawer a couple of days after she met with probation in October. Studer provided a urine sample, which tested positive for the presence of meth and amphetamine. She has since been sen-

The complaint indicated that Sundquist has a lengthy criminal history dating back to 1978. Those convictions include over a dozen crimes ranging from misdemeanors to felonies and involving marijuana, cocaine and/or meth.

Libraries' state park pass program expands

NMF launches "Retain" Loan Program to support existing child care providers

Child care providers who have been in business for more than two years are eligible to apply for a forgivable loan to fund facility upgrades and improve-

The Northwest Minnesota Foundation is now offering the Retain program as an expansion of its Child Care Finance Program to support existing child care

Loans are available up to \$10,000 for family child care providers and up to \$20,000 for child care centers. Loans are forgivable after five years, but repayment will be required for anyone who closes their business before the end of the loan term.

Successful applicants will be notified by the end of October; those not selected will be placed on a waiting list should additional resources become available. Eligible applicants are child care providers who operate in the Red Lake Nation, White Earth Nation, or in the counties of Beltrami, Clearwater, Hubbard, Kittson, Lake of the Woods, Mahnomen, Marshall, Norman, Pennington, Polk, Red Lake and Roseau.



Rural Reflections ...

Active listening on the Nelson off-ramp

I think I finally pulled the pin this morning. I am usually up about 4 a.m. and have a routine that I follow even on the weekend. On a recent Saturday morning, I took an off-ramp from the grooved pattern that makes up much of the fabric of my

Pulling the pin is a phrase familiar to anyone with a farm background. Most farm implements are attached to the tractor drawbar with a pin; to "pull the pin" is to simply drop what you are doing and relax. My act was not so dramatic, either; no great decisions made, no life-changing commitment or oath taken up. I just went outside early and had coffee.

I believe in active listening, although not always. Sometimes people listen only in tolerance until it is their turn to talk. This isn't really a conversation; it's more like two separate monologues with no real transfer of information. When I listen, I try to imagine a story in my mind to match the narration that is spoken from the other person involved in the conversation. I thought I would do the same during coffee that morning.

I just sat there with my coffee and my phone. I also was joined by a small pride of cats consisting of Clyde Lizzie and Clifford although boredom soon bid them out for adventure. I have on my phone called "Merlin Bird ID." The birds that morning were talking and, although I don't understand bird, I did want to know who was talking. I turned on the app and let the understanding flow. With each chirp and twitter, the feathered world around me unveiled itself.

I don't find bird books that helpful. They are wellorganized and have great pictures; however, you have to have at least some clue of what you are looking for to use them. For the last year or so, I have been using the Merlin Bird app to reverse engineer the resident or visiting birds around here. The app uses the iPhone's microphone to then identify the bird through its call or chirp, even when I can't see it. I can then go to a bird book or search the internet for a picture of the bird. I then have a good idea of what I am looking for the next time.

Back to that Saturday morning coffee, it was so dark and good. It was humid that morning, but the forecast said some of the humidity would lift and that the temperature would remain cool. I would typically just suffer through the humidity until it got a bit more arid. The forecast promise of relief was so accurate and I enjoyed being present to feel it

At first, the birds, the cats and I all sat in dripping 99%humidity. No wind or other cue foretold the change in weather, it just happened; y lifted humidity felt light and cool. It felt so good to be there for something that I wait for but typically occurs without my attention.

Active listening and active living seem to be two heads of the same coin. To ignore the weather until it says something you like is not listening; it is only tolerance. To hear the birds as a chorus instead of individual conversations is to lack understanding. To actively listen and understand is living.



DNR Fisheries researchers win award for walleye stocking paper

Stocking locally sourced walleye can pay off — especially when it comes to a genetically distinct strain of walleye, the southern Minnesota strain.

After publishing a paper last year titled "Performance and cost advantage of stocking locally sourced Walleye fry into southern Minnesota lakes," DNR researchers won a prestigious national award for their research, the Mercer H. Patriarche Award for the best paper in the North American Journal of Fisheries Management for 2024.

This is great and well-deserved recognition," said Craig Soupir, southern region fisheries manager, in an update to DNR Fisheries staff. "The project has been transformative to our walleye management in Minnesota probably in ways we haven't even realized yet."

The research centered on DNR Fisheries discovering through DNA testing a strain of walleye genetics unique to Lake Sarah in Murray County. Those genes can be traced back to the Waterville hatchery, which stocked Lake Sarah with walleves from the Cannon River watershed and other southern Minnesota sources back in the late 1980s and early 1990s.

While many other lakes require stocking programs to enhance the fish population, Lake Sarah's walleye fishery hasn't needed outside help in more than a quarter-century. As anglers enjoyed reeling in walleye over the years, DNR scientists began investigating why this fishery supported itself while many others needed stocking to supplement the walleye pop-

Researchers found that the local walleye strain outperformed a strain of walleve the DNR had been stocking from northern Minnesota.

Authors of the paper were DNR Fisheries researchers

Logsdon, Shroyer and Loren Miller, and University of Minnesota graduate student Askhan Shametov. The research is highlighted on the DNR fisheries research webpage.

Why are ticks more dangerous here?

As warmer weather takes hold, people are spending more time outdoors, bringing them into contact with ticks that substantially threaten public health.

Ticks and tick-borne pathogens represent the greatest vector-borne disease threat in the United States. (Vector-borne diseases are transmitted to humans or animals, often through the bite of a bloodsucking insect.) Here, the deer tick is responsible for most human infections, transmitting seven human pathogens - including viruses, bacteria, and protozoa – that can cause Lyme and other diseases.

But tick-to-human transmission is not evenly distributed across the U.S. Deer tick populations in the Northeast and Midwest commonly bite humans and transmit Lyme disease, whereas Southern deer ticks

rarely bite and transmit pathogens.

A new study by the University of Minnesota School of Public Health looks at the genetic differences in deer ticks from different geo-graphic areas in the U.S. differences that may explain the regional disparities in Lyme disease transmission patterns. The study, published in Ecology and Evolution, utilized a cutting-edge technology called nanopore sequencing to analyze the genomes of individual ticks from Minnesota, Pennsylvania, and Texas.

The study uncovered two main findings:

There is genetic divergence across regions. The study identified substantial genetic differences between northern and southern ticks. Southern ticks exhibited higher genetic diversity than northern ticks - suggesting different evolutionary pressures among re-

Northern ticks possess genetic variants associated with disease transmission. Researchers uncovered genetic variants in the genomes of northern ticks related to the ability to detoxify substances and prevent blood from clotting, which may influence tick behaviors such as host preferpathogen ence and transmission.

Future research in this area will seek to link phenotypic (behavior or physiological) traits to genetic characteristics, exploring the biological factors that underlie the differences in Lyme disease transmission between tick populations.

The information could improve Lyme disease risk assessments and enhance tick-control strategies.


